Analysis of Students' Feed back 2014-15 Biswanath College, Chariali

- 1. Majority of the students (73.24%) agreed that 71% to 81% of the syllabus was covered in class. 26.76% student agreed that 57% to 71% of the syllabus was covered in UG classes.
- 2. Regarding teachers' preparation for class, major percentage of students (57.2%) found it satisfactory. Another 26% found it thorough.
- 3. 57.3% assessed teacher's ability to communicate as satisfactory another 36.46% termed it as effective.
- 4. Majority students (69.2%) agreed that the teachers encouraged students participation in the class, while another 19.20% were of the view that teacher sometimes encouraged student's participation.
- 5. 59.18% of the students agreed that the teachers were helpful in advising. Another 37.03% found them sometimes helpful.
- 6. Regarding internal assessment, majority of the students (39.10%) found it regular. Another 26.08% found it fair.
- 7. 78.56% students thought that internal assessment would help them on their course grade to improve. Another 17.43% were uncertain about it.
- 8. 68.50% students commented that the teacher provided feedback on their performance with helpful comments.
- 9. Majority of the students (61.42%) agreed that there was opportunity for personal interaction with teachers.26.6% commented that there was to some extent opportunity for personal interaction.
- 10. Majority of the students found the relationship with Administration, Library and Lib. Bearer as good (Admn 55.82%, Lib 54.58%, Lab 48.62%). About 24.23% to 29.19% students found the relationship as average.
- 11. Regarding primary facilities in the college, student's views are different.38.22% students marked drinking water facility as good.35.46% marked it as poor.55.19% marked classroom facility as good, 27.71% marked it as poor. 58.33% students marked toilet facility as poor.26.37% marked it as good.39.67% marked sports as good, 29.10% marked it as average. Regarding common room facilities 39.55% marked it as poor. 29.89% marked it as average. 40.61% found Canteen facility as good. 33.41% found it average.
- 12. Most of the students offered suggestions to improve the conditions of Girls Common Room, toilet and other infrastructural facilities.
