## Students' Feed back 2016-2017

### Biswanath College, Chariali

- 1. Majority of the students (85%) agreed that 80% to 90% of the syllabus was covered in class.15% student agreed that 70% to 80% of the syllabus was covered in classes.
- 2. Regarding teachers' preparation for classes, major percentage of students (80%) found it satisfactory. Another 20% found it thorough.
- 3. 80% students assessed teacher's ability to communicate as satisfactory another 20% termed it as effective.
- 4. Majority students (84.10%) agreed that the teachers encouraged students participation in the class, while another 15.90% were of the view that teacher sometimes encouraged student's participation.
- 5. 76.23% of the students agreed that the teachers were helpful in advising .Another 24.77% found them sometimes helpful.
- 6. Regarding internal assessment, majority of the students (78.17%) found it regular. Another 21.83% found it fair.
- 7. 84.71% students thought that internal assessment would help them on their course grade to improve. Rest were uncertain about it.
- 8. 74.24% students commented that the teacher provided feedback on their performance with helpful comments.
- 9. Majority of the students (75.46%) agreed that there was opportunity for personal interaction with teachers.74.54% commented that there was to some extent opportunity for personal interaction.
- 10. Majority of the students found the relationship with Administration, Library and Lib. Bearer as good (Administration 70.78%, Lib 71.74%, Lab 77.55%). Rests found the relationship as average.
- 11. Regarding primary facilities in the college, student's views are different. 64.26% students marked drinking water facility as good. Others marked it as average.
- 12. 81.26% marked classroom facility as good, 19.74% marked it as average.
- 13. 71.44% students marked toilet facility as good. Rests regarded it as average.

- 14. Regarding common room facilities 74.58% marked it as good. 23.42% marked it as average.
- 15. 55.5% found Canteen facility as good. 45.5% found it average.
- 12. Most of the students suggested that smart class room facilities should be improved.
