Biswanath College, Chariali

- 1. Majority of the students (86.47%) agreed that 80 to 90% of the syllabus was covered in class.13.53% student agreed that 70% to 80% of the syllabus was covered in UG classes.
- 2. Regarding teachers' preparation for classes, major percentage of students (67.46%) found it satisfactory. Rest of the students found it thorough.
- 3. 69.11% assessed teachers' ability to communicate as satisfactory another 30.89% termed it as effective.
- 4. 77.15% students agreed that the teachers encouraged students participation in the class, while another 22.85% were of the view that teacher sometimes encouraged student's participation.
- 5. 68.29% of the students agreed that the teachers were helpful in advising .Another 31.71% found them sometimes helpful.
- 6. Regarding internal assessment, majority of the students (55.20%) found it regular. Another 30.31% found it fair.
- 7. 87.73% students thought that internal assessment would help them on their course grade to improve. Another 12.27% were uncertain about it.
- 8. 76.76% students commented that the teacher provided feedback on their performance with helpful comments.
- 9. Majority of the students (68.49%) agreed that there was opportunity for personal interaction with teachers.31.51% commented that there was to some extent opportunity for personal interaction.
- 10. Majority of the students found the relationship with Administration, Library and Lib. Bearer as good (Administration 66.80%, Lib 66.76%, Lab 59.57%).rest of the students found the relationship as average.
- 11. Regarding primary facilities in the college, students' views are different. 65.28% students marked drinking water facility as good34.72% marked it as poor.

- 12. 76.38% marked classroom facility as good, 23.62% marked it as average.
- 13. 79.46% students marked toilet facility as good and others regarded it as average.
- 14. Regarding common room facilities 67.59% marked it as good. 32.41% marked it as average.
- 15. 48.8% found Canteen facility as good. 51.2% found it average.
- 16. Most of the students suggested making the wi-fi facility available in the College campus.
